1559	manor passed to Anne, wife of John Cotton and Frances wife of Ralph Lee By agreement manor passes to Lees		
1572	Frances lee dies (husband dies 1578) passes to son Edward Donne Lee		
1593	manor conveyed to Sir Robert Dormer afterwards 1st Lord Dormer		
1625	Robert 3rd son of Lord Dormer		
1650	profits of Saunderton St Mary 13s 4d and "certainty" money 2s 6d		
1715	Charles grandson of Robert		
1723	last mention of Saunderton St Nicholas by name		
1749			last mention as a distinct manor

late 1100s	Thame Abbey lands granted to Robert de Saunderton for 2 silver marks , a horse-load of oats and 40d
dissolution	estate in tenure Thomas Winter
1542	granted to Dean and Canons of ChristChurch Oxford
1806	Richard Briggishaw - leasing from ChristChurch
1830	Mrs Schobell bought lease
1862	Mrs Schobell paid "£2 4s 4 1/2d per year and the price of 1 quarter 5 bushels of wheat, 1 peck of malt and two capons - amounting in all from £25 to £30"
